<p>PSED Personal Social Emotional Development</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Play games and encourage turn taking • Help your child to finish what they started • Be consistent with your behaviour management • Praise your child as often as you can 	<p>C&L Communication and Language</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talk to your child • Respond to your child modelling the correct language • Encourage your child to speak in sentences • Help your child to retell a simple event in the correct order <p>If you are concerned with your child's speech please speak to a member of staff</p>	<p>PD Physical Development</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Play catch with a large ball • Help your child to hold their pen with 2 fingers and thumb (not holding pen in a fist) • Help your child become independent when putting on coat or socks and shoes <p>If you need help with toilet training please speak to a member of staff</p>
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<p>Literacy Reading and Writing</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Share lots of books together. Don't forget that you can borrow books from Nursery • Encourage your child to treat books with care. • Point out print in the environment • Play I spy games • Encourage your child to make marks on paper. • Share your writing with your child i.e. if you write a shopping list etc. <p>If you would like more ideas about early reading please see Mrs Williams</p>	<p>Mathematics Numbers and Shape</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Count everything! • Recite numbers to 10 or beyond • Model mathematical language such as I have more than you. Who has fewer sweets? Which train track is the longest? • Point out shapes in the environment • Lay the table together • Go on a number hunt - look at car number plates, numbers on front doors. 	<p>U+W Understanding the World</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talk about people in your family • Talk about interesting things that are happening in your family • Visit interesting places such as Park Hall Farm, Whittington Castle, Hill Fort • Bring to the attention of your child changes that are happening when plants grow. • Encourage children to use age appropriate software on the computer. 	<p>EAD Expressive Art and Design</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Beat out rhythms when you hear music • Encourage your child to move rhythmically • Mix paints together, explore mixing colours • Encourage imaginative play - join in with your child's games!
